Since her appointment as PROMISE Director in April 2011, Dr. Ersek oversees several ongoing analyses examining the associations among patient, surrogate, facility and process (e.g., palliative care consult, bereavement contact) measures to outcomes data (i.e., Bereaved Family Survey). She also is a Core Investigator at the HSR&D Center for Health Equity Research and Promotion at the Philadelphia VAMC and is PI on a recently-funded VA MERIT multi-site study. Dr. Ersek also is Associate Professor, School of Nursing at the University of Pennsylvania. Her area of research and expertise are pain and end-of-life care, with a focus on older adults. Her projects include development and evaluation of a comprehensive curriculum to enhance the palliative care knowledge, skills, and confidence of nursing home staff. Her research group also developed and tested a CD-ROM based end-of-life educational program for nursing assistants working in all clinical settings. She also was the lead author of the original ELNEC- Geriatric curriculum.
